- What is the structure of a story and how does it supply meaning?
- How do we understand and compare characters, setting, and plots, using illustrations and text?
- How do you demonstrate key details of an expository text by finding the main topics of paragraphs in the text?
- How do you use various text features to locate key facts or information in an expository text?
- How do images contribute to and clarify text?
- What reasons does the author give to support specific points in a text?
- How do we compare and contrast the most important points presented by two texts on the same topic?
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- How do active listeners make meaning and decide what to believe?
- How do speakers employ language and utilize resources to effectively communicate a message?

• How do grammar and the conventions of language influence spoken and written communication?
